N.S. wished to congratulate Fiona Newton on her appointment and informed the meeting that he understood that she was very keen to see a Welsh dimension and develop Welsh projects with our assistance.

10. Branch Networking / Publicity and Events Officer.

10.1.K.H. said two main issues. 1. Website & 2.The Conference. No sorry 3, got married.

The web-site has halted of late due to issue 3. but this will be picked up over the comming months. The building of the month is at No 6.ready to go on.

2. The conference was a sucess and we need to build on this for the following year.

K.H. suggested that the subject of the BAR should be developed further.

S.O'R talked about the themes of the White Paper as the possible topic for a conference.

(This will be given further consideration).

D.H. informed the meeting that with the level of expetise and knowledge at these conferences we should be including a workshop.

This was discussed and K.H.thought that it was a good idea having recently been to one. (This will also be given further consideration).

11.Branch Education \ Training and CPD Officers Report.

A.R. informed the meeting that had been under a misapprehension of late. He thought the Education Committee had stopped. But in reality this was not the case he found to his suprise as they had been fully active. It was the Eduction Committees belief that A.R. was not bothered so they had chossen not to inform him.

A.R. was now pleased to inform the meeting that things are now quite different and he is actively emailing the group and receiving consultations.

N.S. asked A.R. a question. "Malcolm Coulson of Cadw gave an interesting presentation to the BHF earlier in the day on developing craft skills but nobody appeared to have been aware of him or of his activities. Had you? A.R. replied "Yes I know Malcolm but I was not fully aware of the work he was develoing.

S.O'R. Confirmed "Yes this is what sometimes happens with organisations".

12. Election of Officers / Branch Committee.

Can I start by once again paying fulsome tribute to my colleagues on the committee and to their dedication to the branch in particular and the IHBC in general over the past 12 months.

Branch meetings have continued to be held on a regular basis throughout the year, second Tuesday every second month, mostly held at the Vaenol near Bangor. It is with pride that I report that 20% of the available membership in the North Wales area often attends the meetings. These meetings are open to all members and I would urge more of you to attend! Your contribution to any discussion will be valued.

Our collaboration with Civic Trust Wales went from strength to strength with an excellent conference on Buildings At Risk at Aberystwyth on July 14th 2006, partly, and very ably, chaired by IHBC President David Lovie. The conference also saw the unveiling of the branch banner!

A meeting was held with the Chief Executive of Cadw, Marilyn Lewis, on 17th July 2006 –attended by Sean O'Reilly our Director, with Neil and me representing this branch. Mrs Jean Booker was also in attendance. The concerns raised in the conference were relayed directly to Cadw at the meeting. The case for inviting the IHBC onto the Historic Environment Group was again pursued, but no direct invitation was forthcoming.

Members have made the case in previous AGMs regarding the lack of branch events. We made a start to remedy the situation in September by combining the branch meeting with a visit to a conservation project in Dinas Mawddwy, Gwynedd. Such occasions sustain the interest of members and act as an excellent recruiting opportunity for new members. We must make a real effort to establish a programme of such events throughout Wales. All suggestions from members for branch events would be very gratefully received. Contributions from members for our web site would be equally welcome.

Membership has steadily increased, but we are still numerically a small branch. We need to attract more building conservation practitioners throughout Wales if we are to achieve our aim of being the standard bearer for historic building conservation. The historic environment is under increasing pressure and the case for conservation good practice can very easily be drowned out by the clamour of other, louder, voices. A stronger branch will enable us to speak with a stronger voice in a cause that deserves to be heard.

Item 7 Branch Representative on National Council's Report

Having attended all the past year's Council meetings, it has been most notable as one in which the management of the IHBC became more professional and clearer. Council meetings now have a better structure and more formal reporting procedures. Council has been developing five new committees in the past year; Finance & Resources, Membership and Ethics, Education Training and Standards, Policy and Communications & Outreach. With clearer aims and better delegation these committees are intended to lessen the burden on Council but above all to get more done. The committees have been developed to involve IHBC members who are not on Council and a number of new volunteers have come forward but there is still room for more. In September Council held a highly constructive business planning day in this move towards a more professional future, which looked at the medium to long term issues the Institute faces and how we address them.

The recruitment of a further full time member of staff will allow the IHBC to promote and expand its research interests and to respond to funding opportunities to do so. And this has been secured through the appointment of Fiona Newton, formerly Branch Representative of the East Midlands region and Conservation Officer at East Lindsey District Council.

Key developments include the development of a draft communications strategy for the Institute. Hopefully some of the aims we have identified will soon be enhancing the service provided to members. There are a number of IHBC posts that are vacant at present. Some of these are entirely new opportunities which present real opportunities to influence IHBC development and undoubtedly Sean will be able to provide details on these.

The 2006 Annual School in Plymouth seemed to many to mark a return to those schools of the past where a committed group of members worked together to produce an event which was well thought out and working to a clear theme. It was well organised, had good speakers, relevant and instructive visits and enjoyable social events. In 2007 the Annual School will be in Liverpool and organisation is well underway for what looks like a good event. It will not be too long until the spotlight will be on Wales to volunteer for an Annual School, following the hugely successful Cardiff event in 1999, something in the North maybe?! The Culture Media and Sport Select Committee Inquiry into HPR has exercised Council considerably over the year. The IHBC submitted excellent evidence for the committee.

The IHBC Director and Bob Kindred appeared on the Institute's behalf in March and the findings of the committee have recently been published. The influence of the IHBC was increased considerably by Bob Kindred's role as advisor to the committee. Unfortunately, no representation issues affecting Wales were raised by the Committee, despite the White Paper covering both countries — a missed opportunity for needed scrutiny. The IHBC was also represented by Ian Brocklebank at the House of Lords inquiry into science and technology.

Further highlights of joint working across the Branch, which I have been involved with, are no doubt covered under other Officer's reports. Needless to say we appear to be growing from strength to strength each year both in members events and membership numbers.

On this final point having done a touch of very simple analysis I thought the attached may be of interest to the Branch, as to our consistency. Although this is only as of 3rd July 2006, I've not been able to gleem as yet what the National picture is, but this could provide a basis for at least ensuring we continue growing and our activities remaining relevant professionally and locationally:
