

SOC user engagement exercise

The Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) is a recognised framework that enables all UK occupations to be classified according to skill level and specialisation. Some SOC users have expressed a need for a greater level of detail than is currently available. In response to this, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) is working with Warwick University's Institute for Employment Research (IER) to launch a user engagement exercise looking at the level and nature of requirements. For now, the remit of this work remains exploratory. There are no plans currently to publish statistics to this more detailed level as it is unlikely there will be availability of large enough sample sizes to make the new job groups statistically viable.

Your insight will however play a crucial role in contributing to the development of the framework.

The survey will remain open until Sept 30th 2019. Analysis of returns will be undertaken throughout the exercise period, with follow up engagement stemming from responses made taking place as required.

SECTION 3: Extension of the SOC

The SOC Extension team have discussed with several organisations how a more detailed framework may be useful to them. These have revealed a range of cases where organisations feel a greater level of detail than currently available would be of benefit. Provided below are some examples of how further extension of the Index could be applied if sufficient evidence is found:

STEM Subjects

There is a known need to build and develop STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths) skills and occupations within the UK. The SOC is currently unable to separate Unit Group 2314: Secondary Education Teaching Professionals into those teaching STEM and none STEM subjects. An extension of the SOC to identify subject area is one theme being considered.

Police Officers

Further disaggregation of Unit Group 3312: Police Officers (Sergeant and Below) could potentially enable officers to be grouped more specifically by rank i.e. detective/constable/sergeant or alternatively by the specific roles that they perform e.g. dog handler/armed response.

Fitness Instructors

Unit Group 3443 Fitness Instructors currently covers a range of roles including weight trainers, personal trainers and yoga instructors. Currently this does not allow for distinction between place of work i.e. private health and fitness centres, local government leisure centres, private home tuition or elsewhere. Is there added benefit to this?

Similar examples can be drawn from across the SOC. The questions of if and how these and other Unit Groups can potentially be disaggregated has been raised by stakeholders for further investigation.

8. Which area/s of SOC would you would like to see considered for having further detail?

Interdisciplinary (cross sector) practices such as those undertaken by IHBC members in built and historic environment conservation practice are difficult to classify – both at 3 digit and 4 digit levels. For example IHBC members use the term 'Conservation Professional' and 'Conservation Officer' - currently used at 2141 for example, in the context of 'SCIENCE, RESEARCH, ENGINEERING AND TECHNOLOGY PROFESSIONALS. Generally IHBC conservation professionals often are more involved with the 'Environmental' than STEM areas, and so fit better with 2142 (Environment Professionals) within the 3 digit range. At the same time many also fit under 211 - Natural And Social Science Professionals – often more specifically 2114: Social And Humanities Scientists.

Capacity for structured linkages across the SOCs to facilitate refinement of classification of roles and skills so they can reflect the real-world practices that inceasingly demand cross-sector and interdisciplinary skills and outcomes, including those tied to built and historic environment conservation practice



In terms of the roles that people undertake, these are very diverse and represent a wide range of fields.


We have 693 individually titled employment roles, of those where there were more than 5 in the membership, the following bar chart shows the breadth and spread of jobs.

Of the 546 jobs we have advertised, the most advertised job was for Conservation Officers with 47, with the addition of Senior Conservation Officers taking the total to 67.
